ACADEMIC PROGRAM INFORMATION

Al Akhawayn University in Ifrane (AUI) is an English medium of instruction institution. Course materials are normally in English however a few graduate level courses can require reading in Arabic or French.

The exchange and study abroad programs are normally open to undergraduates interested in courses in these schools with no restrictions other than university pre-requisites as stated in the catalog for each course. Pre-requisites of AUI courses should be respected but there are exceptions, and the academic advisor should be consulted. Graduate level courses may be open with permission from the instructor of the course.

Al Akhawayn University follows a North American Curriculum

Normal Course Load: 15 Credits (5 classes)

1 Course = 3 scholastic credit hours (SCH)

1 SCH = 15 contact hours

Minimum Credits per semester: 12 undergraduate, 9 graduates

❖ LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

<i>Orientation:</i>	Mandatory
<i>Class size:</i>	Average class size: 19; Range 15-40

<i>Registration in classes:</i>	Upon arrival and during registration
<i>Seats reserved:</i>	The OIP reserves seats in popular classes (but cannot guarantee)

❖ ARRIVAL, DEPARTURE, AND ORIENTATION

<i>Arrival:</i>	International students should arrive at AUI in time to take part in the new student orientation program.
<i>Orientation:</i>	Exchange and study abroad students can be met at Fez airport or train station. Students pay the orientation fee upon arrival to AUI. Attendance is mandatory for all incoming international students.
<i>Departure:</i>	Students should plan to leave AUI within 2 days after the regularly scheduled last day of final exams.

❖ RULES AND REGULATIONS

All AUI rules and regulations apply to exchange and study abroad students. Rules to pay specific attention to are:

- 1) Strict sex segregation in dormitories/student residences. Males and females are not allowed to enter dormitories designated for the opposite sex at any time of the day or night. Breaking this rule will lead to disciplinary action which is usually expulsion from the university. Please note that there are only a few sex/gender segregated spaces on campus including the locker rooms in the gymnasium, some restrooms, and some areas of the mosque.
- 2) No illegal drugs or alcohol of any kind are allowed on campus. Breaking this rule will lead to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion from the university.
- 3) A midnight curfew is in place during weeknights Sunday to Thursday. Students who willfully break the curfew will not be turned away from the university which is always to be considered a secure location. However, their action may lead to disciplinary action.
- 4) Attendance is compulsory in all classes. Missing three or more classes without an excused absence will lead to the grade "withdraw failing" (WF). Full details are in the Student Handbook

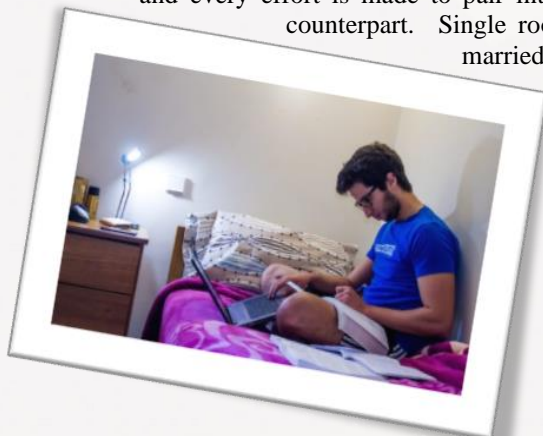

HOUSING AND CAMPUS LIFE

Living on the campus is one of the most exciting parts of moving to AUI. Being a member within the community provides opportunities for students to attend, participate and organize a wide array of programs and activities. On the campus housing helps you become more involved in the college experience, coherently incorporating classroom work with cocurricular activities that support your ambition and goals. Our student dormitories feature modern amenities and stunning views of the surrounding cedar forest. They also include heating systems, cable television service, wired and wireless internet, kitchens, laundry services, and study lounges.

❖ ACCOMMODATION ON CAMPUS

All exchange and study abroad students are required to live in university housing on the campus. Normally, housing is based on double occupancy and every effort is made to pair international students with a Moroccan counterpart. Single rooms are not available. Housing for a married couple provided that both are students is possible but available on a case-by-case basis. Students with children cannot be accommodated.



❖ HOUSING FEES OUTSIDE REGULAR SEMESTERS

There is a charge for housing during end of semester breaks. This fee will be based on the daily rate for the room. For example, in 2017 this fee was 100 MAD per night for a double room. Students are not normally asked to remove belongings from the room during the winter break between semesters.

COURSES OFFERING

Al Akhawayn University offers a variety of courses. International Students can register in any of the courses offered by the university's schools; School of Science and Engineering, School of Business Administration, and School of Humanities & Social Sciences. ❖ LANGUAGE COURSES

Language courses in Arabic, French, Spanish and sometimes Berber are offered each semester. All language classes use the immersion method in which only the target language is used. A placement test during the orientation and registration period is required for any student requesting a language course after the beginning level. If there are less than 5 students, a course cannot be offered but every reasonable attempt will be made to accommodate international students. Very advanced students of French will be placed into classes of Moroccan students polishing their languages skills in French as second language learners which are labeled FRN. French as a foreigner language are labeled FRE. International students/nonnative speakers of Arabic normally only register in Arabic classes labeled ARA. Very advanced learners of Arabic may be placed in to classes labeled ARB with Moroccan and other students of native or near native ability. Intensive Arabic courses are only offered in the summer as part of the Arabic and North African Studies summer program.
